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Affiliate Survey - Executive Summary

The Affiliates Survey was sent out electronically to 34 affiliates and 30 replied, representing 88% of ICJW's affiliates. As can be seen from the list on page 5, the sizes of our affiliates varies enormously – from 15 members to 1 million in Israel, 40,000 in the United States, and 2,000 in the UK. These figures are in line with the distribution of Jewish population around the world.

- Leaving aside Israel, ICJW can claim to represent more than 1 million women in the Jewish diaspora.
- **3** of the 30 responding Affiliates described themselves as Umbrella Organizations, meaning that their various constituent organizations are involved in different activities.
- **90%** of the Affiliates are involved in Voluntary Work, with the highest proportion (84%) working with elderly people in the Jewish community.
- 27 of the 30 Affiliates reported that they work outside the Jewish community. Their voluntary work in the non-Jewish community is carried out mostly with children and young people (69%) and the elderly (58%). 2 of these affiliates volunteer exclusively outside the Jewish community.
- 15 Affiliates report that they offer training to their volunteers (50%).
- 9 Affiliates receive statutory (governmental) or other external funding.
- 7 Affiliates said that their voluntary work is affected by regulations such as criminal record checks.
 Only 2 of these are organizations that receive external funding.
- 23 of the 30 Affiliates reported being involved in **interfaith work**, with 17 (74%) of these interacting with Moslem groups.
- In their **lobbying activities**, 22 Affiliates are active in Women's Rights and Family Issues, 17 on Environmental & Health issues, 16 are involved in Support for Israel /Anti-BDS Campaigning, and 11 are involved actively in campaigning for Agunot. 3 Affiliates are not activist.
- In their **cultural activities**, most of the Affiliates are involved in Arts & Culture, Jewish Education activities, and Jewish festival celebrations. Others are involved in health and general education.
- 19 Affiliates (63%) report that their members fundraise for their own organization.
- Of the 21 Affiliates who are involved in fundraising for other organizations or projects, the highest proportion of Affiliates (81%) raise funds for local Jewish community projects. 13 of them (43%) fundraise for local women's and children's projects.
- **11** of the 30 Affiliates (37%) reported that they raise money for **charities in Israel** either Women's & Children's Charities or Other Charities or both.



1. Which of the following types of Projects is your Affiliate involved with? (30 responses)




2. Voluntary Work: Which groups do you work with in the Jewish community? (25 responses)

3. Which groups do you work with in the wider (non-Jewish) community? (27 responses)



Celebrating Jewish Life in Slovakia

The Conference of Women from the Slovak Jewish Communities and ICJW Branch Organizations entitled "Together Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow" in Košice, Slovakia from June 19-21, 2016, commemorated the

20th Anniversary of Association ESTER.

The Conference, organized by Marta Gyoriová, President of Association ESTER, addressed the topics of national minorities in the city of Košice, the role of eminent Jewish women in Slovakia during World War 2, and the changing status of women in Slovakia. Delegates heard about the history of Košice and its Jewish community and joined two guided tours of the city, highlighting its cultural treasures, monuments and Jewish sites.



The ceremonial reception in the Historic Town Hall was followed by a presentation about 20 years of the work of Association ESTER, together with presentations on Slovak and Jewish culture, at the East-Slovak Gallery, which was attended by eminent representatives of social and cultural life in Kosice.

Liliane Seidman, ICJW Regional President for Europe, and Mary Liling, ICJW's representative to the UN in Geneva, spoke about the history of ICJW and its role yesterday, today and tomorrow. Funding from the Isabelle G. Brown Memorial Fund helped to make the Conference possible.

Inspiring People to Volunteer in Canada

The <u>National Council of Jewish Women of Canada</u> Triennial Convention was held in Winnipeg in September, with a workshop on volunteering funded by the Isabelle G. Brown Memorial Fund.

The workshop was led by award winning American author and TEDx speaker, Dafna Michaelson Jenet. She initiated "50 in 52 Journey", a year-long project where she travelled around the United States to meet with people aged from 14 to 90 who have come up with ideas to solve problems in their communities.

As well as sharing her life story, Dafna led an inspiring 3-hour interactive workshop about issues, problems that they have and what they are doing to solve these problems. A number of people spoke about issues in their communities and the roadblocks that they were confronting. She encouraged the audience to go around these people and think out of the box. Some talked about membership of ICJW and how to encourage younger people to join. Dafna's personal story was inspirational and her words of encouragement and problem solving were positive.

Sharon Allentuck, NCJWC president, reports that almost 80 people attended the workshop, including NCJWC women from Vancouver, Edmonton, London (Ontario), Toronto and Winnipeg, and men and women from the Winnipeg Jewish and general community. NCJWC is very grateful to the Grant Committee for approving this grant to enable them to bring this dynamic community leader to Canada.

Our New Affiliate in Poland

The <u>Czulent Jewish Association</u> in Krakow was formed in 2004 with the aim of preserving Jewish identity in Poland. In November 2016, ICJW President Robyn Lenn visited our newest affiliate and was impressed by the difference that its work is making to the small Jewish community in Krakow.



The Czulent Jewish Association was established as an independent association of Jews in Poland. Association members have different interests and views but share the belief that Jewish identity is something precious that needs to be nurtured and strengthened. The organization is open both to those who are inclined to religion and to those whose Jewishness has a secular dimension, because the foundations of our association are: pluralism, diversity, openness and tolerance.

The Association aims to create a space where members, individually or collectively, may define their identity and meet the challenges they face as active members of the Jewish community of Poland. As well as being affiliated with ICJW, the Czulent Jewish Association is a member of Religions for Peace and the Coalition for Equal Opportunities.

The priorities of the Association are:

- Integration of the Jewish community in Poland, bringing together different age groups and organizations to build a strong sense of community.
- Advancing our knowledge of Jewish culture and tradition, through the Remuh Jewish Library, the "Majn Alef Beis" publishing house, and a Sunday School for 40 children.
- Promoting tolerance and shaping attitudes of openness to differences in national, ethnic and religious minorities, with particular emphasis on condemning anti-Semitism, anti-discrimination education, organizing events relating to anti-Semitism and homophobia, and promoting human rights, gender equality and intercultural relations.

The Czulent Association has been involved in co-organizing conferences and seminars on the Roma Genocide during World War II, and Intercultural Learning and Democracy in a Diverse Europe. They also co-organized an exhibition on Poland's national and ethnic minorities, in partnership with the Anne Frank House and the Museum of Auschwitz-Birkenau. In 2015, ICJW supported Czulent's project "Antisemitism Is Not An Opinion!" with a small grant to help them with the publication of Polish school books on this topic. This project is designed to raise social awareness about fighting, recognizing and learning about modern forms of anti-Semitism in Poland.

We were happy to meet Anna Makowka-Kwapisiewicz, Chairwoman of the Czulent Association, at the ICJW European Regional Conference in Madrid in November 2016, and to welcome her to the ICJW family.
